Dear Ernest & Arlee : I feel that possibly you are overlooking a good bet by not invading the States of New Mexico and Arizona for some very interesting stories. When I was in Roswell, New Mexico in the late 1920's, I found a number of people who still remembered Uncle Jim Cax and his son Bill--- Of course it is a known fact that Uncle Jim-hauled Uncle Blue or Gentle Bluford out of Texas in a Wagon- Under a load of Hides- It is also a matter of known facts that Uncle Jim, stayed in New Mexico and Arizona for quite some time due to the fact that he was a bit apprehensive of the consequences-should it become known that, he had assisted a fugitive from Justice--- In 1930 and again in 1943-44-47-48 I was in Tombstone, Arizona for quite some time-Uncle Jim was still remem-bered there. And of Course "Gentle Bluford" as you call him. Of course it was possible that it was only association of Legend or for that matter it might have been the powers of suggestion or pos-itive thinking on my part that brought theresponses---at any rate we do know that Uncle Jim spent many years in TomMistome- We also feel that Uncle Blue visited him there, possibly move than once.

In 1946, while I was working Ft. Lewis, Washington, I visited the Wasington State Penal Institution, located in Walla Walla. I never met any of them- My father knowing that I was traveling that territory at that time asked me to see if Lizzie Owens was still living-I wish I had taken some notes- Well if I ever have the time I may be able to make the -suspicion that Thoma: Isaac Cox, was the grandfather of Pleasant Cox et al- that we are trying to hem in. He was a close friend of Francis Marion, the Swamp Fox of the Revolution- I was told by my Grandmother that there was some connection, that was the reason for my fathers name-I spent much time when I was in the Carolinas during the 40s trying to make the connection, I learned- Thomas Isaac Cox was from Pennsylvania, He went from Carolina to Missouri-He had many relatives there-He never returned to South Carolina- As he intended-He left one son and a married daughter, near Sumpter- Their Grandchildren- Only knew that their Grandfather, some Uncles and Aunts Went to Missouri- They later thought to Texas-Arkansas-The chain was broken- In Eastern penn. and Jersey, I was told of one of the Clan, who met a Ditch Girl-deserted Eng. Navy- Was apprehended in . the Revolution-Shot- Left Large Family-Oldest son-swore reprisal even though just a youth-went South- became quite a soldier agains British-Met and married Southern Belly Hos name Tom Cox-He never returned to Penn. Stories drifted back about him. He fought with Sumpter and Marion -- There the chain is broken- I believe that son how -that Tom Cox and Thomas Isaac Cox were the same-If so -a legend or a factual story has been woven in the Carolina Hills that would warm the blood of the most devout Yankee-John T.
